PhD Students Present Their Research at the First Columbia 3MT Competition

On December 12, GSAS celebrated the scholarly achievements of our doctoral student community at the second annual [Columbia 3MT Competition](#). Finalists presented their dissertation research in three minutes and only one slide to faculty and alumni judges and an audience of their peers. Richard Warren, a student in [Neurobiology and Behavior](#), won First Prize for his presentation, "Machine Learning Reveals Hidden Beauty in Animal Behavior," and Wei-Li Lee, a student in [Chemistry](#), won Second Prize for "Fluorescent Chemicals to Image Serotonin Release." Divya Venkatesh, in [Biological Sciences](#), received the Audience Choice Award for "Identifying New Molecular Pathways that Alter the Antitumorigenic Ability of Ferroptosis."
